From the Minister

As I write we are at the cusp of Advent. It is a time to be reminded of the arrival of Christ. There are two advents (or comings). The first advent is of Jesus born in Bethlehem and the second when Christ the judge will come. It is a season of preparation. In fact, there is never a time when Christians are not expectant and waiting for the arrival of Christ. It is what keeps us on our toes!

Covid-19 has involved each of our churches in the ritual of preparation, e.g. ensuring that buildings are safe to gather in. We have tried our best to ensure security for each one who comes to worship.

Yesterday the government announced that December 2nd will see the lifting of the current lockdown, with the hope, joy, and liberty that that will bring. It is, therefore, the expectation that our churches will be able to re-open for worship on **Sunday 6th** December. During our two periods of lockdown our church buildings have been closed. We have still been able to worship by means of the Sunday worship sheet or on Zoom but we have missed the fellowship of meeting together on a Sunday in person. Even during the few weeks we have been open, we have not really had the opportunity to share our usual fellowship due to social distancing measures. We may miss this fellowship but the major question that I have been reflecting on is whether **our presence** has been missed in the community. Has our community really been bothered or even aware that our church buildings have been closed?

Certainly people have missed the opportunity to gather at Open House and Twinkles for a break in their day to talk to others and enjoy tea or coffee. We have also missed the opportunity to meet people from the wider community during our

Saturday morning sales and coffee mornings, but has our church as a fellowship reached people so much that they have noticed the lack of our presence on a Sunday morning?

Has the pandemic been a time of testing for us? Our numbers are small and are not increasing. Do we need to take this time to reflect on whether our current forms of worship need to change? If our numbers decreased to the extent that we had to consider closing the church would anyone in the community really be concerned? Have we in recent years really been fulfilling God's mission for us or have we become isolated in our church building on Sunday mornings?

There are no easy answers to any of this! We all need to reflect on whether we are working to fulfil God's mission in the right way and what we can do to make people want to learn more about what we believe and why. We need to plant the seeds in people's hearts and nurture them so that they grow and flourish. It is down to us all to work for God in our community and to make the church a living, vital presence in our town. Please reflect on this and pray to God to guide us, so that when we reach the 'new normal' we may be revived by His Spirit.

Rev. Richard Cecil

As you may know, during the hall modernisation work, a gravestone was found under the floor of the small hall. Obviously when the hall was built (remodelled) early last century they did not consider this of sufficient importance to merit preserving like the Taylor stone. However, they must have felt that it was of some importance for it to be preserved under the floor. It has been resited now to the left of the entrance gates, resting against the wall.

I decided during the summer to do a rubbing of the inscription, which I did on a rather windy day and therefore due to that and the fact that there was cement still left on the surface, it was incomplete. I have now managed to fill in the blanks through tracing them with my finger and give below the inscription. Perhaps we could give some thought to preserving this in some way from further weather damage as Rev. Cecil played an important part in training missionaries both here, including David Livingstone, and at Turvey in Bedfordshire.

In Memory of Salome, (Wife of the Revd. Richard Cecil, Minister of this Chapel). She died 3rd of June 1844 aged 43 years.

Also of Salome, their second daughter, who died 23rd of February 1843 in her seventeenth year.

Lucy Jane, (Eldest daughter of the above Revd. R., Cecil and Salome, his wife, and wife of the Revd. John Hay), who died aged twenty years, 19th January 1844 at

Vizagapatam, where together with their infant daughter, she was interred.

If we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so they also who sleep in Jesus, will God bring with him. 1 Thessalonians 4c 14v.

This inscription is similar to the stone above the door by the organ in the church, but the latter does not mention the infant daughter. Joan

God is with us

It is fair to say we're all a bit uncertain about what Christmas is going to be like this year – and perhaps we're feeling a bit anxious about this. It's also fair to say that this year as much as ever it is critical we reach out to people who aren't part of our churches. The Christmas message of Emmanuel – the good news that God is with us – feels perhaps more pertinent than ever before in this extraordinary year.

The Methodist Church Christmas campaign for 2020 **#GodIsWithUs** seeks to share this good news through twenty-four stories of individuals and their experiences of this extraordinary year. Each day of Advent we will share a testimony from somebody connected to the Methodist Church reflecting on what hope has looked like for them this year and how they have experienced God with them.

The individuals whose stories the campaign tells include those who have felt the painful effects of isolation this year, who have experienced extreme poverty, who have struggled with poor mental health, who have lost loved ones – like so many millions of others. But ultimately, incredibly, God's loving presence radiates from each of them in beams of powerful hope. Hope that is so necessary for such a time as this.

The campaign name, which ties in with our Presidential theme for the year, of course comes from John Wesley's purported words on his death bed: 'the best of all is, God is with us' which reminds us that even in the times which feel most uncertain, we can be certain of God. Who do you know who needs to hear this message over the coming months?

The materials ask questions which encourage Methodists and non-Methodists alike to consider their own story of faith in 2020 and to share it with one another or online.

The campaign aims to encourage Methodists to reflect, share their stories, and reach out to others outside the church and encourage them to do the same.

Green Issues

Climate Change More than 60 faith leaders, including representatives from the URC and Methodist churches, signed a letter last month which called on the UK Prime Minister to commit to bold reductions in fossil fuel emissions particularly ahead of the COP26 summit next year. Some of this has been entirely necessary, but there is a need to consider carefully as to where adjustments and reductions in the use of single use plastic can be made. Having a Green Christmas. Plan your festive gifts well - for your pocket and for the planet! Get creative with home-made crafts or food or invest in something that helps someone else enjoy nature. If you're really trying to cut back from shop-bought stuff, why not offer to do something nice for someone? Going further - agree to a 'No Unnecessary Presents Pact' or send your Christmas cards online rather than by post or have a communal church card. More waste ends up in landfill over Christmas than during the rest of the year, so why not cut down on food or decorations or try buying recycled/recyclable wrapping paper or crackers.

International Aid

Both the URC & Methodist churches expressed strong concern over the possibility of the government reducing the budget for overseas aid, with a clear feeling that these difficult times make it even more important to maintain this commitment to our overseas neighbours.

The URC Mission council "believes that a commitment to the poorest in the world should not be an optional extra but at the heart of our country's responsibilities, especially in the context of a global pandemic and a climate emergency." Link to article.

The Revd Richard Teal, President of the Methodist Conference, and Carolyn Lawrence, Vice-President, said:

"Times are tough for many of us – both here in the UK, and for our brothers and sisters across the globe. UK Aid is a percentage of the UK's GNI – and so it changes each year, and is never beyond what we as a nation can afford. It is vital that we preserve the UK's reputation as a champion of global justice. A measure of a nation's values is seen not only by actions in times of plenty but by resolve during other times too. As Christians, we believe it is our duty to stand alongside our global neighbours, and seek justice for the most vulnerable. As we are called to love our neighbours – wherever they might be - remaining vocally committed to 0.7% GNI is a moral imperative."
