

An Easter Message

"It is the hour to rend thy chains, the blossom time of souls. Katherine Lee Bates

"Tomb, thou shalt not hold Him longer; Death is strong, but Life is stronger; Stronger than the dark, the light; Stronger than the wrong, the right." Phillip Brooks

"And he departed from our sight that we might return to our hearts, and there find Him. For He departed, and behold, He is here." St Augustine

Many of you will know by now that I love a good quotation; they can say so much, so well. The truth is that other people have often said things much better than I ever could and when it comes to thinking about Easter, the quotations above are pretty good ones. It is indeed the time to rend our chains, to acknowledge that though death is strong life is stronger, and to know that though He is gone, He is here.

Easter, that magnificent moment when God overcame death in Christ, that marvellous time of year when Winter gives way to something that blossoms anew with life, is knocking on our collective door, and we do well to open that door up. In our words, in our deeds, and in our worship, we have the power to swing wide that door and in so doing, become signs of Easter ourselves. Indeed, the truest sign of Easter may be a disciple or a group of disciples, who live out the gospel generously and joyfully.

Add to all of this that there are some signs of new life and enduring life at our church. Consider the following:

- In January and February this year, once again, our church took part in an effort to feed homeless people, and those of us who helped really enjoyed doing it.
- On Monday mornings all Winter long, some of us have been opening the church to passersby offering them a warm space and a hot drink. That too has been good.
- On January 28th of this year Winifred Abena Kumi and Sarah Jones were baptised. It was wonderful. They are now both precious members of the body of Jesus.
- Almost every Sunday we have new people come to our church. Not all of them stay but some do, and these new people give us all great encouragement.
- Our Youth Church leaders continue to try very hard to instil faith and love in our children. They are to be celebrated and thanked for their precious work.
- Though they are not big, our four Bible studies continue to be great places of learning, faith, and fellowship. Those of us who take part in them love them.

- On the afternoon of April 28th, we are having a Mission Event aimed at young families and are advertising it in other churches. Doug Horley will be leading a Circus Praise Party that should be great. You can read more about it ON PAGE 10 in this magazine.
- On July 6th we are having another magnificent picnic in the Stow Park. The theme, once again, will be Christ the King, and we will be having the same kind of wonderful entertainment, food, and worship that we have enjoyed the last two years.

Somehow Easter is bound up with all of the above, is there in the midst of all of our events and all of our efforts, is here as we strive to be the best Christians we can be, is present as we rend our chains and acknowledge that though He is gone, behold He is here.



SEEING GOD by Arthur Revels

I recently read this to Yvonne and she thought it a good idea to include in the magazine. It is based on the beatitude 'God blesses those whose hearts are pure for they will see God'.

One of the greatest privileges of my life in recent years has been to spend a good deal of time with people who are blind or partially sighted. I am constantly blessed by them and am conscious that they are often far more aware of what is going on than those of us with sight. We get distracted by the visual clues and don't listen nearly as hard as they do. This Beatitude naturally causes me to think of my blind friends and forces me to think to ask what Jesus meant when he talked about seeing God. In his gospel, John makes it clear that none have seen God.

I believe that Jesus is saying that the person whose heart is purely focused on him has uninterrupted closeness to God. There is nothing in the way, it is describing life at its best, when we have a complete awareness of God.

Flashback

Returning to the theme of World Mission, I am going to relate to you the pioneering work that Rev. John Buxton did in the Far East between 1962 and 1972. [John was the Minister at St. Andrew's from 1979 to 1990, and then for a short while in 2004.]

John's first posting in the Far East was to the newly formed Republic of Indonesia in 1962, at the Bible School in Medan in the province of North Sumatra, having spent 6 months prior to assignment mastering the Indonesian language. New ground was broken when the school had its first intake of students from the Batak community, as hitherto all students were ethnic Chinese. John was responsible for establishing the Indonesian course, and translating textbooks from English into Indonesian. When John started, the school had 24 students; by 2005, the student number had grown to 186, and the church could move onward with an entirely indigenous ministry. At John's time, the Methodist congregation of Indonesia was around 12,000; it has now grown to over 120,000!

By 1965, the situation on the ground had changed, and all British missionaries were pulled out. John was posted to Malacca, Malaysia, embedded in the church there. Apart from day-to-day work at the church, his main task was to continue the translation of English Bible and hymns into Indonesian, drawing on his expertise of the Indonesian, Malay and Greek languages. There was at the time still anticipation for the British missionaries returning to work in Indonesia.

In 1968, a need in the Methodist church in the Paya Lebar neighbourhood in Singapore had arisen for someone who could serve the Malay-speaking community there where the population was predominantly English-speaking ethnic Chinese. John was asked to join as the minister for the church. When John started, the church had a congregation of 450 to 500, now it has grown to over 3,000!

John stayed there until the end of 1971, when he returned to the UK with wife Maureen and children David and Barbara, to continue his ministry, first in North Wales, then Harlow, Basildon and Barton. He and Maureen had since been back to Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore several times to visit the communities there, to conduct services on special occasions, and to advise on mission work. He was pleased to see how the churches had grown, and continue to grow confidently with local ownership. No doubt that John's work has had an indelible impact on the Methodist church in that region, and it just shows how important it is to continue supporting mission work overseas.

The photos below are from the period when John was in Paya Lebar, Singapore. The one on the left is of John with children David and Barbara in March 1968. The one on the right shows John with the Boys Brigade of the Methodist Youth Fellowship in June 1969. This article is based on interviews conducted with John and on material he supplied. I am also grateful to John for letting me use the two photos.

became radiant and exceedingly white, as no launderer on earth can whiten them.


Elijah appeared to them along with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus.






