Epping Protests

It has been a very difficult and troubling summer in our town. At the end of July, the church released the following statement regarding the unrest jointly with St John's Church, St Albans Coopersale and Epping Restore Community Church:

"As churches we share in the distress of our community in recent days and weeks. We acknowledge the fears of so many of our friends and neighbours, and are shocked by public words of hate and anger. We recognise that we all have different experiences and viewpoints; what brings us together is our collective responsibility to live peacefully together and prioritise justice, kindness, and care for one another, remembering our shared humanity. With others we are praying and working for peace, patience, and unity, and for our community to remain a place of safety and welcome for all who live and work here."

We have hosted two prayer vigils which were both well attended by Christians from all over the town and beyond (including by our friends in Zimbabwe!). Churches in the ecumenical partnership, Eastern Synod, and across the whole denomination and beyond have praying for the situation in the town. We have also collected clothing and other items for the refugees and have supported local charities who are supporting the

refugees. The elders are involved in further responses both within the wider church and in the local community- please speak to them for more information.

The response to the protests were reported on by Churches Together in England:

In response to the increasingly violent demonstrations and counter-demonstrations in Epping, the local United Reformed Church will open its doors to offer a place of peace, silence and prayer to those who feel helpless and unheard. The gathering is timed at 2pm on Sunday, 27 July, to coincide with the large disorder planned this weekend, offering residents an alternative space.

Local Christians, who have long supported the asylum seekers housed in the hotel, are looking for further ways to reassure and calm the community.

Epping URC Elder Lindsey Brown said: "We are acutely aware that although local feeling is high the situation is being aggressively exploited by outside groups, including elected 'leaders'."

The first prayer meeting held earlier in the week was attended by members of six or seven other local churches. Lindsey said: "It was extremely wide-ranging. We prayed for all those impacted, but we prayed also for rain, and against any spread to other parts of the country."

Philippians 4:6—Don't worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and thank him for all he has done.

Churches Together in England General Secretary, Bishop Mike Royal, said: "I'm grateful for local church and Christian voices of reason in Epping. There is nothing to be gained by the violence we have seen towards the police, asylum seekers and innocent people caught up in the disorder. An individual has rightly been arrested for the alleged crime; it's time to deescalate and work for calm and peace in the local community."

A letter of gratitude and hope from the URC Finance department

To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Grace and peace to you all.

Our hearts are filled with gratitude for the faithfulness and generosity you have shown to God's work through your local churches. Your contributions - whether through time, talents, or treasure - have been a beautiful expression of discipleship and community.

Celebrating Faithful Stewardship

In these challenging times, when many families have faced difficult decisions about household budgets, rising energy costs, and the ongoing cost of living pressures, your continued commitment to supporting God's work has been truly remarkable. We have witnessed the church at its best: caring for one another, maintaining mission and ministry, and trusting in God's provision.

Your financial contributions through the Ministry & Mission Fund have enabled us to continue our shared calling across England, Scotland, and Wales. Through this Fund, we support ministers' stipends, theological training, Assembly gatherings, and the vital central services that strengthen our witness and ministry in every community we serve.

God's Provision in Action

We rejoice that in 2024, despite significant economic challenges, your collective giving to the M&M Fund reached £16.2m - slightly behind our budget, but late contributions in early 2025 would have taken us over the budget, had the auditors allowed us to bring them in. This achievement reflects not just financial commitment, but spiritual resilience and trust in God's faithfulness.

We are particularly grateful for the additional support from our Synods, who contributed approx. £2m of the amount noted above, demonstrating the interconnectedness of our church family. Total income for 2024, including investment income and grants etc. was £18.5m.

While our expenditure of £20m resulted in a deficit of £1.5m for 2024, we remain committed to balancing our budget over the next 4-6 years through difficult, but necessary reductions in central costs and continued partnership between local churches and Synods.

Looking Forward with Hope

As we move through 2025, we recognise that challenges remain. Economic pressures continue to affect both individuals and churches. Yet we face the future with confidence, knowing that God's call to faithful stewardship remains constant, and that together we can continue to serve Christ's mission in our communities.

We have a clear plan: Synods have committed to maintaining their enhanced support, and we are implementing careful budget reductions of an average of 3-5% annually in our central costs. This balanced approach ensures we remain good stewards while maintaining our essential ministries.

A Call to Continued Faithfulness

In the spirit of 2 Corinthians 9:7, your giving has been a source of joy and strength to the whole church. As we move forward, we invite you to continue this journey of faithful

stewardship, giving "as the Spirit directs and as our means allow." We understand that every church's situation is unique, and we celebrate with those who have been able to meet their full commitments, while also deeply appreciating those who, facing their own challenges, have continued to prioritise the M&M Fund within their means.

Partnership in Ministry

As officers of our denomination, we treasure our roots in local URC congregations and LEPs. We understand firsthand the joys and challenges of local church life, including the financial pressures you face. This shared experience strengthens our commitment to wise stewardship of the resources you entrust to us. Your local church treasurer has received detailed financial information and can answer specific questions about our accounts. If further assistance is needed, our finance team at Church House stands ready to help.

Our Deepest Thanks

To every member who has contributed to their local church, to every congregation that has supported the M&M Fund, and to all who have made this work a priority even in difficult times—thank you. Your faithfulness enables ministry to continue, training to be provided, and the gospel to be proclaimed across our three nations.

May God bless you abundantly as you continue to be faithful stewards of all that He has entrusted to you. Together, we participate in God's wonderful work of transformation, both in our own lives and in the world around us.

Fairtrade Fortnight 2025

Do it Fair this Fairtrade Fortnight

This Fairtrade Fortnight, whoever you are, there are many simple actions you can take to make the trade system fairer – leading to a fairer world for all who rely on it.

This Fairtrade Fortnight will be taking place 22 **September – 05 October 2025**. Over these fourteen days we'll be asking each of you to **Do it Fair**. We'll be celebrating the difference

we can all make when we choose Fairtrade and campaign as part of a UK-wide movement calling for a fairer system behind the things we consume every day.

With the world in a tailspin, fairness isn't a given. But the power to get there is in our hands. Together, our actions can have a positive impact on real people's lives. Fairer pay. Fairer treatment. Fairer futures. That's Fairtrade. It's not just a label – it's a movement. So, whatever you do, and however you do it: **Do it Fair.**

This years campaign is focusing particularly on tea. Do you enjoy a cuppa? How do you like it – with sugar? Strong? With milk? Apart from water, tea is the world's most popular drink. However, it is more than a drink, it's a daily ritual, a comfort, enjoyed during a break or while catching up with loved ones. In Britain we drink over 100 million cups of tea every day! However, behind every cuppa lies an untold story – the people who carefully pick the tea leaves and carry up to 30 kilograms on their backs at a time. They face poverty, unsafe working conditions and climate change, leaving them unable to plan for their future.

Ms Umawathi has worked at her tea estate for the last 35 years as a Tea Leaf Plucker. Starting as a temporary worker, she gained the security of a permanent position in 1990. Back then, the salary was just 34 rupees a day (less than 30p) and she brought up her family on that wage. 'Before Fairtrade came, wages were low. Us and the children had to survive on those wages. We had to manage everything within that.' Born and raised in the tea growing hills of South India, Ms Umawathi is raising her two sons here. 'Here, the children's education is supported by Fairtrade. ... They pay for the tuition as well... they also provide bus services... Those elsewhere don't get all of this'. With support from the Fairtrade Premium, her husband underwent an important eye operation. The tea estate now offers a regular eye clinic to its workers, their families and surrounding communities, providing glasses to those who need them and diagnosing any medical issues. Ms Umawathi feels passionately about improvements made to her working conditions: 'For me, Fairtrade is about environmental health. It should be a plastic free area, and the drinking water should be clean. Bathrooms should be... nearby.

The Fairtrade foundation is asking the UK government to Brew it Fair. Act by signing their petition



Season of Creation 2025

The Season of Creation (1 September - 4 October) is dedicated to God as the creator and sustainer of all life. During this period of the church calendar, many churches celebrate Harvest, thanking God for His provision through the land and food that is grown. It's a time when churches and congregations are called to pay special attention to the responsibility of humanity for the Earth and for all that lives upon it, and to pray for our world. The theme for the Season of Creation 2025 is peace with creation, based on Isaiah 32:14-18. The prophet Isaiah pictured the desolated Creation without peace because of the lack of justice and the broken relationship between people and God. This description of devastated cities and wastelands reveals how human destructive behaviours have a negative impact on the Earth.

Our hope: Creation will find peace when justice is restored. There is still hope and the expectation for a peaceful Earth. To hope does not mean to stand still and quiet, but to act, pray, change, and reconcile with Creation and the Creator in unity, repentance and solidarity.

The Symbol for 2025 is the Garden of Peace and is characterized by a dove carrying an olive branch bringing life to the Garden of Peace.
